REQUISITES

SYNOPSIS

This is the third course which provides the opportunity for students to build upon their investigation and development of conceptual and theoretical processes to explore and extend their visual art practice. An agreed program of work will be developed with relevant lecturers which will demonstrate the further integration of theory and practice. This course will present students with further opportunities for specialised, in-depth studio practice and related research projects in their chosen media.

OBJECTIVES

On successful completion of this course students will be able to:

1. demonstrate further development of creative practice by undertaking self-directed, project oriented studies in visual arts practice;
2. develop high levels in accomplishment and practical skills, through the synthesis of theory and practice;
3. further attain increased capability for developing selective, individual programmes of creative investigation, together with a capacity to theorise and for constructive self-evaluation.

TOPICS

1. This is the third course of studio project specialisation. This course is designed to further develop skills acquired in Studio Project 2. A written contractual proposal of individual student work goals and schedule is developed in consultation with studio discipline/inter-discipline heads and supervisors. Regular critiques with studio heads involved in the contract will occur. Studio drawing, journals, self evaluation, analysis and verbal clarification of concepts and art making/production will be emphasised.	100.00

IMPORTANT ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

- 1 Attendance requirements:

- 2 Requirements for students to complete each assessment item satisfactorily:
To complete each of the assessment items satisfactorily, students must obtain at least 50% of the marks available for each assessment item.
- 3 Penalties for late submission of required work:
If students submit assignments after the due date without prior approval, then a penalty of 10% of the total marks available for the assignment will apply for each of the first FIVE working days late, after which a zero mark will be given.
- 4 Requirements for student to be awarded a passing grade in the course:
To be assured of a passing grade, students must demonstrate, via the summative assessment items, that they have achieved the required minimum standards in relation to the objectives of the course by obtaining at least 50% of the total weighted marks for all summative assessment.
- 5 Method used to combine assessment results to attain final grade:
The final grades for students will be assigned on the basis of the weighted aggregate of the marks (or grades) obtained for each of the summative assessment items in the course.
- 6 Examination information:
There is no exam for this course. End of Semester assessment will be by a panel of Visual Arts staff. Students present all work as proposed by them to the staff panel who award grades as per USQ marking system. Student must be in attendance at the end of semester assessment to discuss their work.
- 7 Examination period when Deferred/Supplementary examinations will be held:
Given the details under (6) above, there are no deferred exams for this course. However, if any deferred/makeup work is granted, it would have to be submitted by a date set by the examiner.

ASSESSMENT NOTES

- 9 (a) The due date for an assignment is the date by which a student must lodge the assignment at the USQ. This must be produced within five days if required by the Examiner. (c) In accordance with University's Assignment Extension Policy (Regulation 5.6.1), the examiner of a course may grant an extension of the due date of an assignment in extenuating circumstances such as documented ill-health. (d) Students who have undertaken all of the required assessments in the course but who have failed to meet some of the specified objectives of the course within the normally prescribed time may be awarded the temporary grade: IM (Incomplete-Makeup). An IM grade will only be awarded when, in the opinion of the examiner, a student will be able to achieve the remaining objectives of the course after a period of non-directed personal study.
