SYNOPSIS

This course continues the study of, and practice in set design. Students will investigate the practical problems of design, the function of design components, the researching of design. Art direction and its perspectives become integral to the student's thinking, in the presentation of models and design concepts. Basic CAD and computer imaging to assist the design process, electronic image manipulation and practice in creating and rendering conceptual sketches.

OBJECTIVES

On completion of this course students will be able to:

1. demonstrate a working knowledge of various computer applications for delivering technical, conceptual, and construction drawings;
2. demonstrate a sound knowledge of advanced model-making and scenic art skills;
3. demonstrate an understanding of the practical workings of design for a specific performance venue;
4. demonstrate a sound working knowledge of basic props and costume design and making.
