SYNOPSIS

This course will concentrate on the development of sub-editing, layout and design skills through theoretical studies and practical work. A focal point will be the professional issues that arise. Instruction will be given in copy-tasting, layout, handling illustrations, writing headlines and blocklines, print production and electronic sub-editing. Students will also contribute to an on-going discussion group. Students are expected to have regular access to e-mail and the Internet. This course demonstrates how to use desktop publishing software and students will become familiar with working in these environments.

OBJECTIVES

On successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. edit their own and other reports to a given length and to perform editing on a desktop publishing system; (assessment item 3 refers)
2. demonstrate an understanding of fundamentals of print production. (assessment item 4 refers)
3. demonstrate an understanding of the principles of layout and design in publications. (assessment items 1 & 2 refer)

- 1 Attendance requirements:

- 5 Method used to combine assessment results to attain final grade:
The final grades for students will be assigned on the basis of the weighted aggregate of the marks (or grades) obtained for each of the summative assessment items in the course.

There is no exam for this course.
- 7 Examination period when Deferred/Supplementary examinations will be held:
Given the details under (6) above, there are no deferred exams for this course. However, if any deferred/makeup work is granted, it would have to be submitted by a date set by the examiner.

ASSESSMENT NOTES

- 9 (a) The due date for an assignment is the date by which a student must lodge the assignment at the USQ. (b) Students must retain a copy of each item submitted for assessment.
