RATIONALE

Law provides a framework within which businesses may operate - regulating, to a greater or lesser extent, their structures, management and transactions. An appreciation of the legal ramifications of particular actions and inactions is important for those entrusted with managerial responsibility.

SYNOPSIS

In order to introduce students to the impact of law on business, this course looks at the Australian legal system and the courts (for example, the way in which legislation and legal decisions are made and their significance). It also covers in some detail areas of the law relevant to business, such as contract law (including agency law), selected topics from the law of torts, remedies, aspects of the law relating to some of the main business structures, aspects of property law and aspects of bankruptcy law.

OBJECTIVES

The course objectives define the student learning outcomes for a course. The assessment item(s) that may be used to assess student achievement of an objective are shown in parentheses after each objective. On successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. understand and, where necessary, describe the Australian legal system, its components and the way it operates (Assignment, Examination)
2. demonstrate basic skills in statutory interpretation and the operation of precedent (Assignment, Examination)
3. explain the basic principles of law in the specific substantive topics covered (Assignment, Examination)

4. identify the legal issues raised by case studies and apply the relevant legal principles to resolve those issues (Assignment, Examination)
5. demonstrate satisfactory skills in communication (Assignment, Examination).

ASSESSMENT NOTES
