REQUISITES

Pre-requisite: NUR2020 and NUR 2030

RATIONALE

Medical surgical nursing comprises a large proportion of nursing practice. Students need to develop the ability to apply their knowledge of pathophysiology and pharmacology to processes of dysfunctional health patterns to facilitate appropriate nursing interventions for patients experiencing medical surgical problems.

SYNOPSIS

This course applies the concepts of "vulnerability" and the maintenance of "integrity" to the nursing care of individuals. The broad causal factors of disease and pathophysiology underpinning the endocrine, nervous and musculoskeletal systems are examined. They are examined from the perspective of strategies nurses can use to minimise the vulnerability of clients experiencing biophysical problems. Concurrently students are encouraged to develop strategies to increase the personal integrity of these patients. Sixty (60) hours of clinical experience is included in the course in order to integrate and contextualize the material covered and in order to partially fulfill the requirements for registration with the Queensland Nursing Council.

OBJECTIVES

On completion of this course students will be able to:

1. demonstrate a sound knowledge of the pathophysiology, pharmacology and nursing care related to the course content areas;
2. identify and discuss the action, dosage, and adverse effects and patient teaching related to therapeutic drug regimes;
3. integrate and apply knowledge of pathophysiology, pharmacology and the collaborative role of nursing to the holistic management of patients in the clinical setting;

4. demonstrate the ability to critically analyse events and intervene appropriately to plan, implement and evaluate safe and appropriate nursing care for vulnerable clients experiencing compromised health by using systematic data collection and effective clinical reasoning strategies, incorporating evidenced-based practice;
5. for laboratory classes and clinical practice, demonstrate the psychomotor and interpersonal skills necessary to safely undertake clinical experience;
6. demonstrate the satisfactory completion of 60 hours of clinical experience as partial fulfillment of QNC requirements;
7. demonstrate appropriate professional communication in written and verbal form;
8. interact effectively with other members of the health team in the clinical area; and
9. undertake an accurate and comprehensive assessment of clients experiencing physical disorders that have been covered at the time of placement.

IMPORTANT ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

1 Attendance requirements:

It is the students' responsibility to attend and participate appropriately in all activities (such as lectures, tutorials, laboratories and practical work) scheduled for them, and to study all material provided to them or required to be accessed by them to maximise their chance of meeting the objectives of the course and to be informed of course-related activities and administration. Students must complete 60 hours of clinical experience as partial fulfillment of Queensland Nursing Council requirements for registration. To ensure that students can satisfy the objectives of the clinical component of the course,

they must attend, and actively participate in all tutorials and laboratory sessions in this course prior to undertaking Clinical Experience.

- 2 Requirements for students to complete each assessment item satisfactorily:
To complete each of the assessment items satisfactorily, students must obtain at least 45% of the marks available for each assessment item. To complete the Clinical Experience satisfactorily, students must complete 60 hours of Clinical Experience as organized by the Nursing Department and obtain a satisfactory standard on the performance evaluation profile thus gaining the 1 mark for Clinical Experience. Clinical experience will be provided on the basis that students: a) meet attendance requirements, b) hold a current CPR certificate, c) have a current confidentiality form on file and d) have an immunization record on file.
- 3 Penalties for late submission of required work:
If students submit assignments after the due date without prior approval then a penalty of 10% of the total marks gained by the student for the assignment will apply for each working day late.
- 4 Requirements for student to be awarded a passing grade in the course:
To be assured of a passing grade, students must: a) obtain a mark of 1 for clinical experience, b) submit all of the summative assessment items and c) achieve at least 45% for each item and 50% overall for a passing grade. Students who do not qualify for a Passing grade may, at the discretion of the Examiner, be awarded a Supplementary Examination and/or assigned additional work to demonstrate to the Examiner that they have achieved the required standard. It is expected that such students will have gained at least 45% of the total marks available for each of the summative assessment items.
- 5 Method used to combine assessment results to attain final grade:
The final grades for students will be assigned on the basis of the weighted aggregate of the marks obtained for each of the summative assessment items in the course.
- 6 Examination information:
Candidates are allowed access only to specific materials during a Restricted Examination. The only materials that candidates may use in the restricted examination for this course are: writing materials (non-electronic and free from material which could give the student an unfair advantage in the examination); calculators which cannot hold textual information (students must indicate on their examination paper the make and model of any calculator(s) they use during the examination). Students whose first language is not English, may, with the Examiner's approval, take an appropriate non-electronic translation dictionary (but not technical dictionary) into the examination. Students who wish to use a translation dictionary MUST request and receive written approval from the Examiner at least one week before the examination date. Translation dictionaries will be subject to perusal and may be removed from the candidate's possession until appropriate disciplinary action is completed if found to contain material that could give the candidate an unfair advantage.
- 7 Examination period when Deferred/Supplementary examinations will be held:
Any Deferred or Supplementary examinations for this course will be held during the next examination period.

ASSESSMENT NOTES

- 9 The due date for an assignment is the date by which a student must despatch the assignment to the USQ. The onus is on the student to provide proof of the despatch date, if requested by the Examiner.
- 10 Students must retain a copy of each item submitted for assessment. If requested, students will be required to provide a copy of assignments submitted for assessment purposes. Such copies should be despatched to USQ within 24 hours of receipt of a request being made.
- 11 The examiner may grant an extension of the due date of an assignment in extenuating circumstances.
- 12 The Faculty will normally only accept assessments that have been written, typed or printed on paper-based media.
- 13 Students who have undertaken all of the required assessments in a course but who have failed to meet some of the specified objectives of a course within the normally prescribed time may be awarded the temporary grade: IM (Incomplete - Make up). An IM grade will only be awarded when, in the opinion of the examiner, a student will be able to achieve the remaining objectives of the course after a period of non directed personal study.
- 14 Students who, for medical, family/personal, or employment-related reasons, are unable to complete an assignment or to sit for an examination at the scheduled time may apply to defer an assessment in a course. Such a request must be accompanied by appropriate supporting documentation. One of the following temporary grades may be awarded IDS (Incomplete - Deferred Examination; IDM (Incomplete Deferred Make-up); IDB (Incomplete - Both Deferred Examination and Deferred Make-up).
