### SYNOPSIS

Surveying is the science of measuring and mapping features on the earth's surface. The mapping of features is an important step for the transformation of ideas into reality for projects that require land to be developed. The services of Surveyors are required at all stages for new construction projects and land developments. This course introduces students to surveying equipment, services, theory, measurement techniques and calculations.

### OBJECTIVES

The course objectives define the student learning outcomes for a course. The assessment item(s) that may be used to assess student achievement of an objective are shown in parenthesis. On completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. express a broad understanding of surveying theory and its application (assignment 1 and exam);
2. describe a range of surveying field practices (assignment 1 and exam);
3. demonstrate and apply angular measurement methods (assignment 1 and exam);
4. demonstrate and apply distance measurement methods (assignment 1 and exam);
5. demonstrate and apply survey adjustment techniques to data from a survey traverse (assignment 2 and exam);
6. solve plane coordinate problems (assignment 2 and exam);
7. solve area and volumetric problems (assignment 2 and exam); and
8. use an automatic level to undertake a level traverse and correctly reduce the data (assignment 2 and exam).

- 1 Attendance requirements:

To satisfactorily complete an assessment item a student must achieve at least 50% of the marks or a grade of at least C-. Students do not have to satisfactorily complete each assessment item to be awarded a passing grade in this course. Refer to Statement 4 below for the requirements to receive a passing grade in this course.
- 3 Penalties for late submission of required work:  
If students submit assignments after the due date without prior approval then a penalty of 15% of the total marks available for the assignment will apply for each working day late.
- 4 Requirements for student to be awarded a passing grade in the course:  
To be assured of receiving a passing grade, a student must achieve at least 30% in each of the weighted assessment items, achieve at least 45% in the examination and at least 50% of the total weighted marks available for the course.
- 5 Method used to combine assessment results to attain final grade:  
The final grades for students will be assigned on the basis of the weighted aggregate of the marks (or grades) obtained for each of the summative assessment items in the course.
- 6 Examination information:  
In a Restricted Examination, candidates are allowed access to specific materials during the examination. The only materials that candidates may use in the restricted examination for this course are: writing materials (non-electronic and free from material which could give the student an unfair advantage in the examination); handheld battery powered programmable calculators (students must indicate on their examination paper the make and model of any calculator(s) they use during the examination).
- 7 Examination period when Deferred/Supplementary examinations will be held:  
Any Deferred or Supplementary examinations for this course will be held during the examination period at the end of the semester of the next offering of this course.

## **ASSESSMENT NOTES**
