SYNOPSIS

The objective of this course is to introduce students to the legal principles associated with partnerships, associations, trusts and corporations. In particular, students will be exposed to the Partnership Act and Corporations Law in detail and shall be required to be able to describe all appropriate legal principles dealing with such entities and the internal and external relationships thereof.

OBJECTIVES

On successful completion of this course students should be able to:

1. define, analyse, illustrate and apply principles of partnership law
2. describe, analyse and apply the basic principles of law affecting trusts
3. identify problem areas of the law affecting unincorporated bodies and the consequences of having incorporated associations
4. define, illustrate and apply principles of corporations law including those applicable to: the incorporation of companies; relations with third parties; membership; corporate governance; meetings and procedures of companies; finance of companies; external administration of companies
5. demonstrate satisfactory skills in communication.

ASSESSMENT NOTES

- 1 Assignments: (i) The due date for an assignment is the date by which a student must submit the assignment to the USQ. (ii) Students must retain a copy of each assignment submitted for assessment.
