RATIONALE

This course provides the student with important music skills which supplement Performance courses. Important elements in the development of a musician are aural awareness and a knowledge of music writing techniques.

SYNOPSIS

This course is a survey of the major formal structures found in Western concert music from the 16th century until the present. It also further develops aural acuity relating to pitch, melody, rhythm, three- part work, dynamics, harmony and form. Each succeeding Music Craft course further develops this acuity.

OBJECTIVES

On successful completion of this course students have:

1. acquired basic skills in elementary music analysis;
2. further developed their powers of aural observation and awareness.

IMPORTANT ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

- 1 Attendance requirements:

ASSESSMENT NOTES

- 9 (a) The due date for an assignment is the date by which a student must lodge the assignment at the USQ.
