SYNOPSIS

Political and Economic Ideas (POL2000) introduces student to influential economic ideas that have shaped politics. More specifically, the course critically examines the impact of economic thinking on politics and government at different stages during the history of industrialisation. POL2000 adopts an international perspective by comparing different national interpretations of political and economic ideas both in the West, and elsewhere. The course is designed to be relevant to students from a broad range of disciplines and does not require prior knowledge of politics or economics.

OBJECTIVES

The course objectives define the student learning outcomes for a course. The assessment item/s that may be used to assess student achievement of an objective is/are shown in parentheses after each objective. On successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. understand economic thinking and the way it affects politics and government (Assignment 1, Assignment 2, Examination)
2. understand different national interpretations of political and economic ideas (Assignment 1, Assignment 2, Examination)
3. demonstrate the capacity to critically evaluate political and economic theory through comparison and application (Assignment 2, Examination)
4. demonstrate the capacity to write an appropriately structured report supported by evidence and justification (Assignment 2, Examination)

5. demonstrate the capacity for written communication by a report using appropriate format and conventions (Assignment 2, Examination)
6. demonstrate information literacy by finding appropriate literature to inform and support report analysis and recommendations (Assignment 1, Assignment 2)
7. demonstrate the capacity to apply scholarly conventions through the appropriate use of referencing (Assignment 1, Assignment 2).

- 1 Attendance requirements:

To satisfactorily complete an individual assessment item a student must achieve at least 50% of the marks. (Depending upon the requirements in Statement 4 below, students may not have to satisfactorily complete each assessment item to receive a passing grade in this course.)
- 3 Penalties for late submission of required work:
If students submit assignments after the due date without prior approval of the examiner, then a penalty of 5% of the total marks gained by the student for the assignment may apply for each working day late up to ten working days at which time a mark of zero may be recorded.
- 4 Requirements for student to be awarded a passing grade in the course:
To be assured of receiving a passing grade a student must achieve at least 50% of the total weighted marks available for the course.
- 5 Method used to combine assessment results to attain final grade:
The final grades for students will be assigned on the basis of the weighted aggregate of the marks (or grades) obtained for each of the summative assessment items in the course.
- 6 Examination information:
This is a restricted examination. Candidates are allowed access to specific materials during the examination. The only materials that candidates may use in the restricted examination for this course are English translation dictionaries (but not technical dictionaries).
- 7 Examination period when Deferred/Supplementary examinations will be held:
Any Deferred or Supplementary examinations for this course will be held during the next examination period.

ASSESSMENT NOTES

- 1 Assignments: (i) The due date for an assignment is the date by which a student must despatch the assignment to the USQ. The onus is on the student to provide proof of the despatch date, if requested by the examiner. (ii) Students must retain a copy of each assignment submitted for assessment. This must be produced within 24 hours if required by the examiner. (iii) In accordance with university policy, the examiner may grant an extension of the due date of an assignment in extenuating circumstances.
