
USQ ALLY Network Newsletter

The term 'LGBTI' confuses desire, behavior and identity—and it's time we rethink it

The rise of sexually transmissible diseases made front-page news in The Age, which tried to make sense of the rise among "gay men" and "heterosexual people". This illustrates the increasingly common confusion between behaviour and identity. What is involved is sexual contact, or to use the expression common in the early days of the AIDS epidemic, the "exchange of bodily fluids".


